#### **Boom and reliability**



Faster, higher, further? No. We value solid development and consistently high quality far more. Which means we are very happy with 2019 – a year in which many of our activities ended with fantastic results, and others were consolidated at a high level.

Particularly worthy of mention is the outstanding result in our International Projects Department, which broke all records with more than 2,200 international assignments within a single year. Another reason for celebration is that the lion's share of these assignments took place in Africa and Asia, regions that are particularly relevant to development policies.

In Germany, too, our offering has been extremely well received. With over 5,500 new assignments, which almost exclusively benefited the next generation in schools and on training courses, we were able to make an important contribution towards improving the qualifications and successful training of young people. Particularly considering the shortage of specialist workers, the importance of this is not to be underestimated.

A glance at our Expert register also gives cause for optimism. In 2019, every month an average of 130 new Experts came to us, somewhat more than in the previous year. They have all been won over by the idea of SES and see voluntary knowledge transfer to be a valuable contribution to collaborative development, as well as giving a boost to the younger generation in Germany.

Thus we began the new '20s with great energy and ready for anything, and had two successful months – and then, as it has for so many other organisations, coronavirus forced us to put the brakes on. Naturally, we put all the recommended safety measures in place with immediate effect: all assignments were stopped, all events cancelled.

It is still too early to predict how things will develop over the rest of 2020. One thing we can be sure of, however, is that we will be back in full force as soon as the situation returns to normal. We are lucky enough to have the security of reliable support from both public and private benefactors, which gives us confidence even in difficult circumstances.

Huge thanks are due to the German Federal Ministry for Economic Cooperation and Development (BMZ) and the German Federal Ministry of Education and Research (BMBF). The financial contributions from these two organisations was what enabled most SES assignments to take place in 2019, as in previous years. # **Creation of value through voluntary service Engagement 'generates' millions of euros a year**

SES is one of those organisations for which voluntary service plays a decisive role. It would have to close its doors were not for its voluntary Experts. The fact of the matter is that not only do they carry out assignments both within Germany and abroad, they are also active within SES.

Every single department or section at the headquarters in Bonn has voluntary support, each of the 17 SES offices nationwide is led by volunteers, each and every regional representative is a volunteer, as is every regional coordinator of the VerA training initiative.

If for that reason alone, volunteer work has a great value for SES which is more than simply symbolic. It represents many tens of millions of euros, and is part of our overall economic performance.

The basis of this calculation is 'assignment days', which are valued at €250 or €40 each, depending on the location and work involved. A day spent on one of the SES programmes within Germany that helps the next generation is valued at €40. A day on an assign-

ment abroad, or with companies, professional bodies or organisations in Germany, is valued at €250.

The result for 2019 is a real attention-grabber; it really brings home the magnitude of the service the SES Experts provide. There were around 172,800 assignment days, adding up to a value of around €21.6 million.

#### The future needs experience

#### Helping people to help themselves

SES has been promoting know-how transfer by volunteers since 1983. All around the world, its Experts use their specialist expertise and professional experience to offer people help in helping themselves. Their assignments take place in developing and newly industrialised countries, but also in Germany, where they mainly benefit young people undergoing specialist training.

For many years, all the SES Experts were retired. However, since the start of 2017 SES has also been sending people on assignments who are still in work. We created Weltdienst 30+ especially for them - solely for assignments abroad. It strengthens the engagement of the middle generation in collaborative development work and has been a success from day one.

#### Over 130 registrations a month

With 1,582 registrations during the course of 2019, SES gained about the same number of new Experts as in the previous year. Over 130 new Experts were registered on average every month. This means that the influx was above average for the second year in a row.

By the end of the year, 10,909 Experts had placed their knowledge at our disposal. 1,336 of them are still working professionally, and are interested in Weltdienst 30+ assignments, a particularly fine result for the 'junior division' of SES, still in its relative infancy.

Equally pleasingly, the proportion of women has also risen once again. Back in 2000 it was six percent, and in 2005 nine percent, but by the end of 2019 it was over 22 percent. This upward trend can largely be attributed to the Weltdienst 30+ scheme, as more than 57 percent of our younger SES specialists are women.

#### **Know-how from 50 industries**

SES can also be very content with the broad range of expertise that its Experts bring to the table. They hail from around 50 industries and several hundred individual professions. Skilled trades and crafts, technology, trade

and industry, services and commerce, administration and public service, education and science: there is hardly a field that the SES cannot cover.

#### Top topic: attracting experts

Nevertheless, improving the Expert database in terms of both quantity and quality is one of the most important tasks that SES has. Every year, many assignment requests go unmet because the necessary specialist knowledge or language skills are not sufficiently represented in our register of Experts. In addition, when preparing each assignment we have to speak to five to six Experts before we find the right person.

Most urgently sought-after are specialists in all areas of skilled trades and crafts, and in healthcare. The same goes for anyone who knows their way around the German vocational training system, both in theory and in practice, or who can offer expertise relating to agriculture, renewable energies, plastics, mechanical engineering or foodstuffs. Across all fields, there is a great need for Experts with good foreign language skills.

SES tackles such shortages through targeted press and public relations campaigns, by directly approaching selected professional and specialist associations, and by networking with individual companies.

#### Improving regional cover

A further challenge comes from the large number of services that SES offers within Germany in order to prepare children, young people and trainees for their careers, as well as to help them integrate well into society.

With its programmes that encourage new talent within Germany, SES offers its Experts opportunities for assignments close to where they live. There are not enough Experts in rural areas, nor in some urban agglomerations, where SES would like to engage yet further with the younger generation. Efforts will be intensified to recruit more specialists in these locations.

#### **Expert knowledge for southern lands**

#### **Know-how made in Germany**

SES international assignments bring specialist knowledge from Germany into developing and newly industrialised countries. Its Experts provide support to small and medium-sized enterprises, educational and health-care establishments, public authorities and charitable organisations – always in response to demand, always tailored to the needs of the client, always on the principle of helping people to help themselves.

This system is the key to SES' success. It means SES assignments represent a valuable contribution to German collaborative development work. The German Federal Ministry for Economic Cooperation and Development (BMZ) has recognised this with over three decades of sustained support.

#### Top results

In 2019, SES carried out 2,206 assignments in 85 countries outside Germany, 280 of which were part of the Weltdienst 30+ scheme. An average of 184 Experts were dispatched every month. By the end of the year, the number of all assignments abroad since SES was founded had risen to 35,656.

These figures represent a record result for SES. Never before has it carried out more than 2,200 international assignments within a year. The number of assignments has risen since the previous year, by over eight percent. Meanwhile, the number of Weltdienst assignments has again increased significantly – proof of how well our younger Expert service is also received by

#### All-time high in Africa and Asia

There was high demand overall from all countries in the south, but our projects in Sub-Saharan Africa and Central Asia have developed particularly well. These locations showed high growth rates of close to 30 percent and nearly 17 percent respectively. The individual countries that hosted the most assignments were Kazakhstan, Tanzania, China, Indonesia, India and Uzbekistan.

All around the globe, SES prioritised local economies and concentrated on fighting poverty, as well as promoting vocational training, healthcare and agricultural development. All these topics are central to German collaborative development work and have also characterised the work of SES for years.

#### A worldwide network

The lion's share of the international success of SES can be attributed to the quality of its global contacts. By the end of 2019, its network of Representatives consisted of more than 200 people and institutions in 90 countries – all important as initial points of contact for potential clients, as well as for clients who are already familiar with SES.

And SES sets an accordingly high value on regular exchanges of ideas and experiences with its Representatives. Since 2008, seminars in Bonn have proven invaluable in deepening our relationships with Representatives. Three of these workshops took place in 2019.

## Follow-up assignments and post-assignment activities

In 2019, just over a fifth of all assignments abroad were part of a series of assignments, and thus classed

as follow-up assignments. In addition, around 20 percent of the Experts we dispatched later supported 'their' clients from Germany with post-assignment activities. They made contact with companies, assisted in the purchase of machines and spare parts, or acted as knowledgeable companions during visits to specialist trade fairs.

#### **Best evaluations**

The high proportion of follow-up assignments alone is a measure of what a positive reception the SES' services are given. The evaluation results confirm this impression. They are based on field interviews and questionnaires, which, as in previous years, were sent out in 2019 to both clients and Experts after each assignment abroad.

Out of the 73 percent who responded, 85 percent of clients reported that the aim of the assignment had been either completely or mostly achieved. 97 percent praised the collaboration with the SES Experts. 87 percent emphasised that the assignment had improved their own or their staff's expertise, and 86 percent expressed the wish for a further Expert assignment.

The SES Experts were slightly more modest in their assessment. Out of the 93 percent who responded, 75 percent said that the aim of the assignment had been met, either completely or mostly. 81 percent considered it useful to run a follow-up assignment, and 69 percent underlined their willingness to engage in post-assignment activities from Germany.

# Partners in business Mentoring the younger generation

#### Coaching by the pros

As a foundation set up by German industry, with close links to its main associations, two topics are of particular concern to SES: supporting the private sector, and improving the prospects of the next generation of specialist workers in Germany.

Since as far back as 1990, SES has offered its assistance to small and medium-sized enterprises, charitable organisations and professional associations in solving technical, economic and organisational problems. For over ten years, it has also been engaging with young people in schools and on training courses – which is, today, its main focus within Germany.

#### Promoting young talent and aiding integration

SES undertakes a wide range of services for tomorrow's generation. Children and young people benefit from its schools programme, Neue Impulse für Schülerinnen und Schüler [A New Boost for Schoolchildren]. SES supports trainees with its VerA initiative, which serves to prevent them dropping out.

Since 2015, SES has also been more heavily involved in the integration of young refugees into school and employment. At a national level, it has also been cooperating with the Coordination Agency for Training and Migration (KAUSA) and the German Federal Ministry

of Education and Research (BMBF); and, at a federal state level, with the Baden-Württemberg Ministry of Culture, Youth and Sport.

#### A pleasing result

In 2019, our projects within Germany developed extremely well. A total of 5,572 assignments were carried out across Germany – almost 90 percent of which were part of the VerA training initiative. This meant that the mentorship programme was once again by far the most successful individual service provided by the SES.

#### Schools programme in ten German states

The schools programme, Neue Impulse für Schülerinnen und Schüler [A New Boost for Schoolchildren], also enjoys great popularity. This service, which is available to all types of school and all school years, has long been established in Baden-Württemberg, Hesse and North Rhine-Westphalia. It is now also on offer in Bavaria, Bremen, Lower Saxony, Saarland, Saxony, Saxony-Anhalt and Thuringia.

A New Boost for Schoolchildren brings the know-how of experienced specialists to both general and vocational schools. At the heart of the programme are projects that complement the standard curriculum, and that improve the qualifications of young people – for

example, by passing on practical skills, giving tutorials in the MINT subjects (mathematics, IT, natural sciences and technology), or support in choosing a career. Another big topic is helping young immigrants to integrate.

With its schools programme, SES not only wins over children, young people and teaching staff; it also becomes an 'eligible prospect' for funding, and has, for many years, been financed solely by donations and sponsorship. Support comes from a number of large corporate foundations, several firms and many smaller donors, all of whom believe in the importance of nurturing the next generation at a local and regional level.

#### The VerA initiative on the road to success

For several years now, the VerA mentorship programme, which aims to prevent trainees dropping out, has been the flagship project of SES in Germany. In 2019 it again could hardly keep up with demand: the result is the impressive figure of 5,001 mentorships across Germany as a whole.

Every one of these pairings helps a young person who is finding their education difficult. This support is of use in all fields of practical study, always helpful from an individual perspective, and it has enjoyed outstanding success: in 2019, over 70 percent of VerA mentees overcame their problems because they had an SES Expert by their side.

From 2020 onwards SES intends to increase awareness of its VerA Initiative in rural areas, among people with an immigrant background and among trainees in nursing and healthcare professions. It is a great help to SES to have the support of the German Federal Ministry of Education and Research (BMBF) in financing the VerA Initiative, as well as collaborations with professional bodies, chambers and their umbrella associations.

#### **Sites in Germany**

SES is represented throughout the whole of Germany: with 17 offices, several regional representatives and around 80 regional coordinators, the VerA initiative has a dense network of contacts at its disposal. This network acts as the basis for voluntary staff to maintain contact with Experts, companies, professional bodies and associations. They also support SES in its public relations

work, represent SES at specialist trade fairs and organise regional conferences that allow an exchange of experiences.

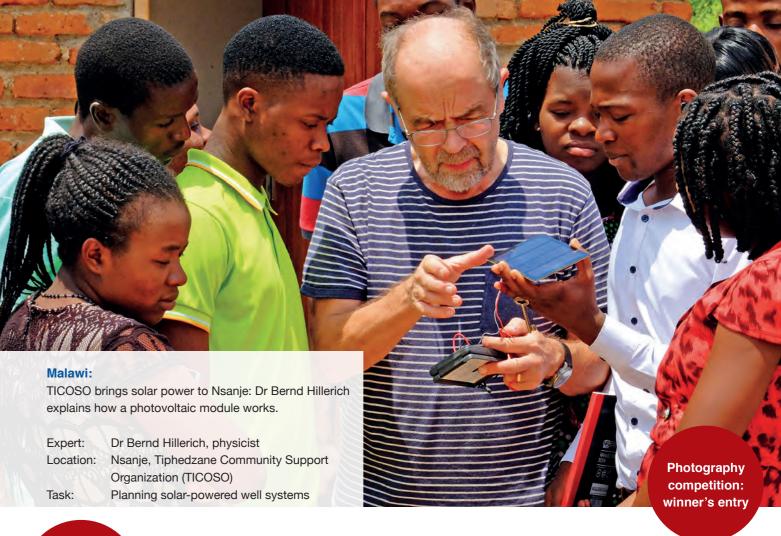

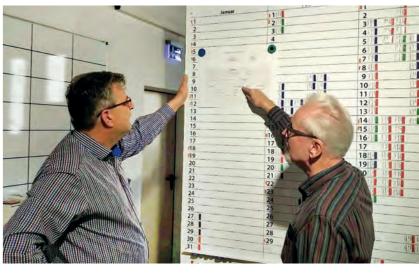

The VerA initiative, which exists to prevent trainees dropping out, is a nationwide mentorship programme to help promote specialist training for young people. VerA brings trainees together with retired specialists, who give them one-to-one coaching. For years now, this initiative has been the most successful individual service that SES provides.

#### VerA goes to school in Europe

Since 2017, SES and ten other organisations are working towards getting programmes started in Europe that will mirror VerA. They have set up two EU-funded projects, MYDI\* and EvolYou\*\*, to put this plan into practice. In the meantime, VerA is inspiring a pilot project in Lyon. Further test runs are planned in other parts of France, as well as in Finland, Italy and Spain.

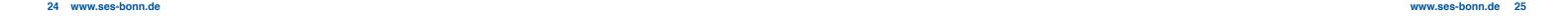

For the SES Sponsors' Association, 2019 was the perfect time for a photography competition, to mark its 35th birthday the year before. They were looking for the best pictures from Expert assignments abroad – pictures that would personify the competition's theme: 'Helping people to help themselves'.

The competition ended with the jury's deliberations on the 30th September 2019 and was a great success, with over a hundred entries. In the end, 13 contributions made it to the final, and three top prizes were awarded, along with a special award.

The three first prizes, all of equal merit, went to Susanne Döbler, Dr Bernd Hillerich and Jörg Wahl for photos from assignments in Morocco, Malawi and Bangladesh. The special award – also for a picture from Bangladesh – was given to Christof Krackhardt.

All contributions in the final round were refined by a graphic designer and attractively framed. They are now ready for a touring exhibition, starting in 2020. Interest in the exhibits has been shown among others by the German Federal Ministry for Economic Cooperation and Development (BMZ) – SES' most important public sponsor.

#### Task

With projects like the photo competition, the Sponsors' Association is intensifying its activities to raise awareness of SES among institutions and potential Experts in Germany. It thus plays an important part in public relations.



Of course, the Sponsors' Association also continues to accept donations, which benefit either individual Expert assignments or whole series of them in developing and newly industrialised countries. In 2019 they funded a total of 20 assignments – most of them in African countries such as Eritrea, Ghana, Madagascar, Togo and Uganda.

## Overall performance and financial position

Despite good assignment figures and a healthy 4-percent increase in revenue, SES has finished the business year 2019 with a €298,000 shortfall. An income of €15.523 million could not balance out expenditure, which totalled €15.821 million.

The most significant provider of funds was, once again, the state. For instance, the German Federal Ministry for Economic Cooperation and Development (BMZ) provided funding for assignments abroad in developing and newly industrialised countries – some €11.5 million. Furthermore, the German Federal

Ministry of Education and Research (BMBF) provided €3.942 million to finance the VerA Initiative, and €76,500 for assignments supporting the Coordination Agency for Training and Migration (KAUSA). The SES Sponsors' Association also subsidised international assignments, to the tune of over €40,500.

The schools programme A New Boost for School-children counts the following organisations among its most important supporters: the Otto Wolff Foundation (€35,000), the Globus Foundation (€11,100), the German BP Foundation (€7,150), the Pfennigsdorf Foundation (€6,000) and Verein Saarwirtschaft hilft Flüchtlingen [Business in Saarland Helps Refugees] (€5,000). And the Landesbank Baden-Württemberg (LBBW) stepped up again as sponsor for assignments in 'welcome classes' for young refugees in Baden-Württemberg's vocational schools.

Spending on project costs amounted to €6.688 million, while staff costs rose to €6.203 million. Costs for materials fell to €2.93 million.

#### Committed to quality

As in every year, in 2019 SES placed particular value on continuing to develop its electronic data processing systems, and on the continued implementation of the quality management procedures introduced in 2009. Investments such as these are essential for SES, as they are in line with its self-image as a 'learning organisation'.

To this end, the efficiency and effectiveness of SES's work is regularly put under scrutiny, both internally and by its partners. The SES sees it as its duty to maintain its work at a high level, on a long-term and sustainable basis, and to make improvements wherever possible. A close network of its own and external checks guarantees that SES uses the monies placed at its disposal correctly and that it constantly strives to improve its work.

#### Creation of value through voluntary service

The preliminary 2019 annual report of the SES has been drawn up according to the regulations of the German Commercial Code (Handelsgesetzbuch – HGB) and has been examined by independent auditors. The local tax office has again acknowledged the charitable status of the SES GmbH.

to support our work play an important role, as do the costs that are borne by the clients. These contributions - only some of which are included in the financial statement in accordance with commercial law - added up to a value of around €19.4 million in 2019. The voluntary work of the SES Experts is impossible to judge accurately in monetary terms. If every day of an assignment in Germany and abroad were valued at the theoretical amount of €250, and every meeting associated with mentoring young people in Germany at €40, then, with around 172,800 assignment days in 2019, we reach the approximate sum of €21.6 million. The public funds injected into the SES, on the other hand, totalled €15.1 million. Adding these two sums together gives a value, for all the assignments carried out in 2019, of a good €56.1 million.

The greatest proportion of this value creation, 38 percent, came about through the voluntary commitment of the Experts. The proportion of contributions in kind from German industry and the costs borne by the clients added up to 35 percent, and the proportion of public funds was 27 percent. In 2019, as in previous years, public funding was matched several times over in the form of Experts' services and clients' contributions.

## **Organisational structure and tasks**

The SES Foundation is the sole shareholder of SES GmbH. The SES Foundation, headquartered in Bonn, was founded in 2003 by the former shareholders of SES GmbH: the Federation of German Industries (BDI), the Confederation of German Employers' Associations (BDA), the Association of Chambers of Industry and Commerce (DIHK) and the German Confederation of Skilled Crafts (ZDH).

The bodies of the Foundation are the Board of Directors, Board of Trustees and Executive Director. The latter has a dual function, being responsible for the dealings of both the Foundation and SES GmbH. The Foundation's Board of Directors authorises the financial and assignment planning of SES GmbH, approves the annual report and appoints and approves the actions of the Executive Director. The Board of Trustees functions as the supervisory board of the Foundation. It supports and approves the actions of the Board of Directors, receives the statement of accounts, and advises on the development and business plan of SES GmbH.

The Board of Directors and Board of Trustees include high-ranking figures from the main associations representing German business, as well as the chief executives of two professional bodies, and well-known representatives of large companies. They all carry out their duties on a voluntary basis. They promote the work of SES and advise the Executive Director on all the most significant issues.

The Foundation's capital added up to more than a million euros at the end of 2019. Returns from this capital are used to benefit strategically important plans of the SFS.

#### **Parliamentary Lunch**

The Parliamentary Lunch is an established fixture among the networking events brought in by the SES Foundation. The Foundation has hosted this high-profile meeting in Berlin every year since 2003 – traditionally in the Deutsche Parlamentarische Gesellschaft (the cross-party meeting place for German MPs).

The Parliamentary Lunch offers an opportunity for informal discussion between SES Experts and members of the German Parliament (Bundestag), along with ambassadors, ambassadors' associates, and guests from the various Federal Ministries and professional associations.

In 2019, the Parliamentary Lunch enjoyed the patronage of the former Federal Minister for Family Affairs and longstanding Chair of the German National Association of Senior Citizens' Associations (BAGSO), Prof. Ursula Lehr. The opening speech was made by Her Excellency Ruth Masodzi Chikwira, Ambassador of the Republic of Zimbabwe in Germany, and Dr Maria Flachsbarth, Parliamentary State Secretary at the German Federal Ministry for Economic Cooperation and Development (BMZ).

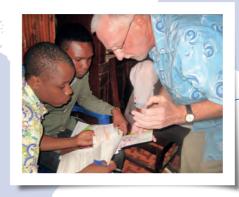
